

From Clean Water Flows Opportunity

The Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District (MWCD) has held conservation at the core of its mission for 90 years and counting. Now, with the twin fortunes of oil and gas revenue and a strong public appetite for stewardship, we are in a unique position to support conservation efforts across the Muskingum Watershed. Our region boasts some of the best water quality in the state of Ohio, but we still have work to do to address impairments. Water quality starts with land use. Increased support for best management agricultural practices, sustainable forestry, and wetland conservation are some of the ways we plan to build our legacy of opportunity for decades to come.

Matt A. Thomas was named Chief of Conservation in September of 2021 after serving as the Water Quality Coordinator for the MWCD since January 2019. In his position, Matt manages and directs the conservation, sustainability, and water quality programs within the MWCD. He brings with him over 20 years of experience working on a diverse array of environmental issues within the Great Lakes and throughout Ohio. His career includes serving as the Laboratory Manager for the biological field station, F. T. Stone Laboratory, in Lake Erie and most recently as the Farm Production Manager for the Route 9 Cooperative in Carroll County. Matt holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Zoology with an aquatic focus from The Ohio State University.
